Tomorrow's Schedule

Consider Your Viewpoint FIRST

- Before reading the sources, take a moment to jot down your ideas about the topic. If you have a firm position, write it down.
- Move beyond "Yes/No" or "Pro/Con" thinking and consider broader ideas that the topic brings to mind.

- While it is true that...
- I grant that...I still maintain that
- Although...
- Of course
- Certainly
- To be sure

Sources

- Read every source with an open mind
- Variety of interpretations and points of view
- Keep in mind the following purposes...

Read to Understand Sources

- Upon first reading a source, quickly underline or circle striking ideas, topic sentences and other key words and phrases.
- What does this source add to the conversation?
- What would this author say in response to your position?

Read to Understand Position

- Put an **where author presents evidence in** favor of your claim
- Where evidence opposes it, put an X

Read for Evidence

• The position you choose should be the one about which you have the most compelling things to say

Interpret the Visual Source

- Determine its relationship to other sources
- What relevant information does it contribute to the discussion of the issue?

What do you have time for?

- Proofread. (2-4 minutes)
- Revisit verbs.
- Identify your thesis statement and strengthen it.
- Identify the most important sentence in your conclusion and strengthen it.
- Check your syntax.
- Strengthen your introduction overall.
- Strengthen your conclusion overall.
- Check your evidence from start to finish.
